Shrine's First Decade of Service Crowns 28 years of Tourist Ministry

hen Walt Disney World opened in Orlando in 1971, an "instant" tourist boom began. It became necessary for the Diocese of Orlando to make provisions for the spiritual needs of the vast numbers of visiting Catholics. In the spring of 1975, Bishop Thomas Grady (RIP) placed Father F. Joseph Harte, Pastor of Holy Family parish, in charge of the tourist ministry. Together with hundreds of lay volunteers, Fr. Harte began to celebrate Masses in local area hotels. It soon became evident however, that the hotels would not be able to continue to facilitate the growing numbers of tourists. In 1979, property was purchased for the building of a facility to care for tourists. It was decided to erect a Shrine Church under the patronage of Mary, Queen of the Universe. The secular world in Orlando boasted of Walt Disney World, SeaWorld, Circus World and other lesser "worlds" of entertainment.


The Church would place Mary as Queen over all in a reminder that all our "worlds" are but a small part of God's creation, and that it is indeed the "world" in the next life which ought to provide the main focus of our attention

Ground was broken for the Shrine on December 8, 1984, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. Within two years the initial facility was completed. Long term, this was to be the *Evangelization Center*. With 600 folding chairs and a blessing from His Holiness, Pope John Paul II, conveyed by the then Papal Nuncio, Archbishop Pio Laghi, the facility opened in November 1986 and became the Shrine's temporary, on-site Church.

On August 22, 1990, Feast of the Queenship of Mary, the Bishop of Orlando, the Most Reverend Norbert Dorsey, C.P. broke ground to begin construction of the main Church which was completed January 31, 1993.

The dedication plaque states, "This Shrine stands in testimony to the faith of Catholics throughout the world through whose generous gifts this building was made possible. May all who visit here find peace and tranquility of soul; and that union with the Creator which is the special gift of God to His people."

Prayer to Mary

centers on her participation in the mysteries of her Son's life

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that "there is no other way of Christian prayer than Christ." The prayer of the Church is addressed above all to the Father who is approached through Jesus' sacred humanity, because he is the human face of God. Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior, is the way to the Father and the way to pray to the Father. Christian prayer also includes prayer addressed to the Holy Spirit. All of the Church's Liturgical traditions have developed the invocation of the Holy Spirit and included it in the celebration of the Sacraments and in worship.

The Catechism teaches us that just as the Holy Spirit unites us to Christ in prayer, so too are we united to his mother in prayer. Mary shows us the way of prayer, her Divine Son. Prayer to Mary centers upon her participation in the mysteries of Christ's life. Marian prayer follows a dual movement. First, it gives thanks to God for what he has accomplished in Mary, and through her for us. Second, it asks Mary to continue in us the work, which through her, God has begun. "Let it be done to me as you say" and "My whole being proclaims the glory of the Lord" sum up the tradition of the Church's prayer.

These two prayers stand ever before us as not only the objectives of our prayer, but also as the objectives of our lives. The Catechism describes the place of Mary in the tradition of prayer in this way: Mary is the perfect "Orans" (pray-er), a figure of the Church. When we pray to her, we are adhering with her to the plan of the Father, who sends his Son to save all people. Like the beloved disciple John, we welcome Jesus' mother into our homes, for she has become the mother of all of the living. We can pray with her and to her. The prayer of the Church is sustained by the prayer of Mary and united with it in hope. (2679)

Easter Sunday

When the main Church was filled to capacity for each Mass, the faithful attended additional masses in a large tent erected beside the Church. Some 35,000 people attended the Shrine's Easter Sunday masses.









Marian Art Treasures at the Shrine

The Shrine's Signature Statue of *Mary*, *Queen of the Universe* is formed from a block of pure white Carrera marble. The 8-foot work stands on a marble base and encloses the names of some 3,000 Shrine associates. The sculptor is Jill Burkee.



Mother and Child Outdoor Chapel Set below the Chapel's soaring 80-foot tower is an inspiring bronze statue of Mary reaching out to embrace her Divine Child. The scene of a Mother playing with her child is a universal symbol of motherhood. The sculptor is Jerzy Kenar.



Centered within the Shrine's Rosary Garden stands an historic statue of Mary holding the Divine Infant in her arms. The statue is more than 100 years old and came from a Convent in Holland. During World War II, the sisters and townspeople stood around the statue and prayed for peace. The cast-iron statue was made in Paris, France.




The Pieta

The Shrine's Pieta extends an invitation to all who might wish to reflect prayerfully upon Christ's redeeming sacrifice and His Mother's enduring grace. Brian Hanlon is the sculptor.



An oil painting of *The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin* by the 17th Century Spanish artist, *Bartolome Murillo*. The painting is in the Shrine Museum. It was presented by the Marist Fathers.



Inside the Day Chapel is a five panel mosaic of *Our Lady of Guadelupe*. Crafted by Rome's *Domus Dei* studio, the mosaic depicts Our Blessed Mother as she appeared before Juan Diego, a 55 year old Mexican Indian in the year 1531. Central to the mosaic's imagery is the figure of our Lady clothed in the miraculous Tilma or Cloak. It is an image known and loved by millions.



Sculpture of St. Joseph and the Child Jesus at Mary Queen of the Universe Shrine.

This inspirational work was sculpted by Bruno Lucchesi. The figures of St. Joseph and the Child Jesus, the workbench and the tools are all made of bronze. (Notice the wedding ring on St. Joseph's finger.) On top of the workbench one can see nails and slats of wood, which make one think immediately of the Cross and the future Crucifixion of Jesus.

SAINT JOSEPH

Joseph's love and fidelity to Mary are well known. He lived with his young wife. He accepted the mysterious conception and the birth of the child. To protect Mary and Jesus from the fury of Herod, King of the Jews, ruled by a Roman Emperor, he fled with them to Egypt. When Jesus was twelve, Joseph took him to the Temple. At one point, when he thought that Jesus was lost on the journey, he became very anxious and worried. These are the main facts that the Gospels relate about Joseph. After he brought Mary and Jesus back from Egypt, we hear nothing more about him.

St. Joseph has special importance for our time. As a carpenter, his work was simple and difficult. No devotion has grown so universal; none seems to have appealed so forcefully to the heart of the Christian people and particularly the laboring classes, during the nineteenth century as that of St. Joseph. The devotion to St. Joseph is greatly influenced by his image of the humble and faithful servant. In 1870, Pope Pius XI solemnly declared Saint Joseph, *Patron of the Catholic Church* and enjoined that his feast should be celebrated on March 19th.

St. Joseph was pleasing in God's eyes because he was a decent man. He accomplished everything God entrusted to his care. He was a splendid success in what mattered to God and his true vocation in life was one of great dignity.

Joseph's life teaches us that even if we live obscure lives and seem to be failures in the eyes of the world, we can be of great success in the eyes of God. While Mary is Mother of the Church, Joseph is the Patron of the Universal Church. Joseph is also invoked as the patron of workers, families, virgins, the sick and the dying. He has also been recognized as the patron of prayer and the interior life,

of the poor, those in authority, fathers, priests and religious, travelers, and all devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

In 1937 Pius XI named St. Joseph as the patron of the struggle against atheistic communism. Although communism has mostly been defeated, his protection is still needed against threats to the truth of revelation and to human dignity, which are evident in today's culture of death.

The Sacred Heart

When I was a young child, a large, gold framed oil painting of the Sacred Heart hung on one of the walls of my parents' bedroom. The face of Jesus looked very kind. His smile always seemed to welcome me as a friend, every time that I stuck my head into the room. And of course, his eyes seemed to follow me, no matter where I would stand.

One day, my older sister Christine and I decided to "steal" a cigar from our father's dressing table. Some of our friends had been boasting to us that they had smoked. So we decided to try it as well. As I knew that the eyes of the Sacred Heart would be looking at me when I crept into our parents' bedroom to steal the cigar, I averted my eyes so that I would not have to look directly at my friend. He might have a disapproving look on his face.

We did not know that the cigar was several years old and was dry and dusty. It had been a gift to our father from a friend of his, who had become the proud father of a new baby girl.

Needless to say, my sister and I became violently ill very shortly after we "lit up" in the back garden behind the tool shed. Our parents quickly came to the rescue and the whole embarrassing story had to be told.

Several days later, I finally got up the nerve to peek into my parents bedroom. The eyes of the Sacred Heart looked directly at me. He still looked kind and friendly. I wasn't sure — but I could have sworn that there was a hint of a smile on his face. I did not hear any voices but the words that came into my head were; "That will teach you a lesson my boy!" Silently I responded, "It sure will — and — I'm sorry!"

The smile on the face of the Sacred Heart seemed to grow friendlier. I smiled back and the Sacred Heart and I have been good friends ever since.

Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus

The historical origins of devotion to the Sacred Heart go back to the dawn of Christianity. Jesus revealed devotion to the Sacred Heart to us, when he told us, in the only direct mandate he gave, to imitate him, by telling us, "Take my yoke upon you and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble of heart and you will find rest for your souls."

Devotion to the Sacred Heart has become widely known only since the seventeenth century; and the Church did not sanction it for general use until the latter part of the eighteenth. When the doctrine was first introduced, it met with great opposition - by the jansenists and also from sincere Catholics who objected because they did not understand it.

Spiritual writers mention homage paid to the Sacred Heart as early as the twelfth century; but it was practiced to a very limited extent until a little more than two hundred years ago. A humble and holy French nun, the saintly Margaret Mary Alacoque, instituted a devotion which will last forever. She became the apostle of the beautiful and now universal worship of the loving Heart of our Blessed Savior.

She was born in Lhautecour, in France, in 1647 and lived until 1690.

After a childhood remarkable for sanctity, she entered the community of the Visitation nuns at Parav-le-Monial in 1671. Here she lived a very holy life. Our Divine Lord appeared to her on several occasions; and in one of these visions He showed her His Heart, pierced with a wound, encircled with a crown of thorns; surrounded by flames and surmounted by a cross. He commanded her to practice and spread devotion to His Sacred Heart because of His ardent desire to be loved by humankind and His wish to give to all humankind the treasury of His love and mercy.



All Margaret Mary's actions and teachings were subjected to a most severe examination. In 1794, however, Pope Pius VI issued a decree approving the devotion to the Sacred Heart and granting indulgences to those who practice it. In 1920, Pope Benedict XV declared Margaret Mary Alacoque to be a Saint.

Throughout this month of June, the Church encourages the faithful to practice this devotion. The Heart of Jesus is a symbol of His Sacred humanity and an emblem of His infinite love for us whom He died to save.

Later in the afternoon, Bishop Dorsey will host a Banquet at 5:30 P.M. at the Hilton Hotel at Lake Buena Vista, close to the Shrine. Musical entertainment will be provided.
