

Crowds attending Shrine emphasize Catholic belief in Eucharist

This past year has witnessed thousands of visitors from many corners of the world visit *Mary, Queen of the Universe Shrine*. More than 30,000 people came to worship at the Masses on Easter Sunday. The traditional Christmas Eve Mass and all the Christmas Day Masses drew thousands of visitors and many locals. Some 2,000 pilgrims attended the Marian Conference in November. The Shrine was filled to capacity on August 22nd to

welcome Bishop Thomas Wenski, the newly appointed coadjutor Bishop of Orlando.

The Shrine is blessed in that we have a wonderful corps of volunteers who come from their home parishes, every week, to assist with the Shrine's ministry of Eucharistic hospitality. So many people flock to the Shrine that each Mass needs the ministry of some ten to twelve special ministers of the

Eucharist to assist the priest in the distribution of Holy Communion.

In addition to thousands of people attending Mass and hundreds celebrating the sacrament of reconciliation, every day sees many people "spending time with the Lord" in the Shrine's Adoration Chapel, walking and praying in the beautiful Rosary Garden or meditating in the outdoor Mother and Child Chapel.








Pope honors Mary, Queen of the Universe Shrine by conferring the title of Monsignor on the Shrine Rector

Saturday and Sunday, November 15 and 16, witnessed celebrations to mark the 10th Anniversary of the Dedication of the Shrine Church. The main event was a Mass of Thanksgiving with His Eminence, Pio Cardinal Laghi presiding and the Most Reverend Norbert M. Dorsey, C.P., Bishop of Orlando, as the main celebrant. Almost 1,000 friends and members of the Shrine "family" attended the Mass. Priests from area parishes and those who assist at the Shrine also joined in the concelebration.

During the Mass, Cardinal Laghi had a surprise for all when he announced that the Holy Father wished to recognize the work of *Mary, Queen of the Universe Shrine* by appointing Fr. F. Joseph Harte, the Shrine Rector, a Domestic Prelate, thus conferring on him the title of Monsignor. Following the Mass, some 500 friends of Mary's Shrine celebrated at a Banquet at the Hilton Hotel.



In his remarks, Cardinal Laghi said,
"Anytime I come to Mary, Queen of the
Universe Shrine, I am amazed. This is
a beautiful Shrine. It is the work of
providence and the work of men." The
Cardinal surprised everyone when he
announced that the Holy Father had told
him to appoint Fr. Harte a Domestic Prelate,
with the title of Monsignor. A standing
ovation followed the announcement.




During his homily, Bishop Dorsey shared the importance that Pilgrimages play in people's faith lives. "When we visit Shrines, we come as pilgrims," he said "Shrines are not our parishes and are not necessarily in our neighborhoods. They are special places. Life itself is a pilgrimage." Since Mary, Queen of the Universe Shrine and many others are devoted to Mary, the Bishop urged people to make a pilgrimage to visit "our mother." He recalled how the Pope was led to devotion to Mary, after losing his family to sickness and disease. The Pope's Motto is "Totus

Tuus" - "*Totally Yours*," referring to devotion to the Blessed Mother.

Bishop Dorsey recalled the history of the tourism ministry, which began more than 28 years ago. Msgr. Harte, the founding Pastor of Holy Family Parish, was also responsible for Masses for tourists within the Disney World area. As the ministry grew by leaps and bounds, Msgr. Harte was designated by the late Bishop Thomas J. Grady to head the tourism ministry on a full time basis. Several years of fundraising by Msgr. Harte and a "devoted band of volunteers" resulted in the current Shrine Church being built and dedicated August 22, 1993.

"On this day we thank God for the tourism ministry," said Bishop Dorsey. He also expressed appreciation to the Shrine's many supporters and volunteers. "May God reward you for your goodness and generosity."

Following the homily, Bishop Dorsey blessed two new art pieces — a bronze statue of St. Joseph working as a carpenter with a teenage Jesus looking on and a white carrera marble statue of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.



At Mary, Queen of the Universe Shrine, the Blessed Sacrament is exposed in the Monstrance for adoration, Monday thru Saturday following the 8:00 A.M. Mass until 5:00 P.M.

Many visitors from all over the world, who come to visit Orlando's Theme Parks, frequently stop by to "spend time with the Lord."

The **Adoration Chapel** is located at the west end of the Church. This chapel is free from all activity and noise and the faithful visit to pray before the *Blessed Sacrament*. The *Marist Fathers* (Washington Province) donated the **Monstrance**, which holds the Consecrated host. A representation of *St. Michael the Archangel* defeating the serpent adorns the Monstrance. When closed, the tabernacle doors exhibit multiple hands stretching out toward a central loaf of bread (the *Body of Christ*), a symbol of the desire of the faithful for the *Eucharist*.



The Crucifix

Early Christians were reluctant to depict the crucified Christ, for they were hesitant to view His death as isolated from His resurrection, and an image of a dead Savior alone failed to express the reality of Christ risen and victorious over death. Thus among all the religious paintings in the ancient Roman catacombs there are no depictions of the crucifixion to be found, nor even among the hundreds of detailed mosaic images in the fifth century Churches of Ravenna in Italy.

Crosses without the image of Christ were common, but they were richly decorated, even with precious metals and jewels. Many decades later, when the image of Jesus began to appear on crosses, it was not the dead defeated Christ, but Christ frequently shown with a jeweled crown on His head, vested in kingly garments, with His eyes open and arms outstretched in victory. This would change in the twelfth and thirteenth centuries, as Franciscan priests and monks, responding to a growing devotion to Christ's passion, began to popularize the image of Christ crucified. This development would reach a high point in the fifteenth century.

A crucifix is placed near the altar in our Churches to remind us, more



Depicted with arms outstretched but with a spirit of repose, this dominant image leads the faithful to reflect upon the sufferings and sacrifice that was our Lord's gift to humankind. Jesus' face is not contorted with pain, but reposed after completing His Father's will and commending His soul to the Father. The translucent Cross is a reminder – that when you follow Jesus, you walk in the shadow of the Cross.

forcefully than would a plain cross, that we who share in the Eucharist must also share in the self-giving sacrifice of Jesus, who even today lavishly gives the loving gift of Himself to us. This is precisely why the Church's Catechism teaches us that if the Eucharist does not commit us to more deeply giving of our resources and ourselves to the poor, then our celebrations of the Eucharist are less than adequate.

"Lord as we venerate the Cross, let us reflect that we ourselves are Christ's disciples and must therefore follow him by willingly taking up our own Cross each day."

Shrine Music Ministry



"Catholic Belief in the Eucharist" Continued from Page 1

The special devotion at *Mary, Queen of the Universe Shrine* is related to the Eucharist. It also emphasizes devotion to the Blessed Mother as one of God's gifts enabling us to reach that Salvation for which Christ gave His life on the Cross.

The Eucharist is the greatest gift Christ has left His Church, a gift that makes the sacrifice of His life present for all time and gives strength and hope to the world, Pope John Paul II has written in the encyclical letter, "Ecclesia de Eucharistia." The Pope issued the letter in the 25th year of his papacy as a sign of gratitude and with the desire to share his faith in the sacrament. In the letter, the Holy Father reaffirmed the traditional teaching of the church on the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist, in the need for validly ordained ministers for its celebration, and on the

importance of following the church's liturgical norms.

The Pope also used the encyclical to express how important the Eucharist has been in his life and offered a reflection on the Blessed Virgin Mary, "woman of the Eucharist."

"Whether in a grand basilica or in a small country church," the Pope said, the "Eucharist is always in some way celebrated on the altar of the world. It unites heaven and earth. It embraces and permeates all creation." Christ's sacrifice on the Cross - His offering of love to God the Father - embraces and redeems all creation and offers it back to God, the pope said. "The church draws her life from Christ in the Eucharist; by Him she is fed and by Him she is enlightened." This is no mere metaphorical food, he said. As the Gospel of John reads, "My flesh is real food and my blood is drink indeed."

In some places, he said, Eucharistic adoration had almost disappeared, and some people focus so much on its character as a "fraternal banquet" that they forget its sacrificial meaning. The Mass, the Pope said, "makes Christ's one redemptive sacrifice present in time" and allows people of all time to participate in it as if they had been in Jerusalem with Jesus.

Inside the **Day Chapel** at Mary's Shrine is a five-panel Mosaic of **Our Lady of Guadelupe**

Crafted by Rome's *Domus Dei* studio, the mosaic depicts Our Blessed Mother, as she appears before Juan Diego, a 55 year old native Mexican Indian, in the year 1531. Central to the mosaic's marvelous imagery is the figure of Our Lady clothed in the miraculous *Tilma* or Cloak. It is an image known and loved by millions.

In 2003, Pope John Paul II traveled to Mexico City to the Shrine of *Our Lady of Guadelupe*, where he canonized the first Indian saint of the Americas, Juan Diego.

Juan Diegos's name is inseparable from the story of Mary's appearance on the hill of *Tepeyac*, the site of an older shrine to Mary now replaced by the modern basilica in Mexico City.

As with all visitations from the mother of God, Guadelupe speaks to the influence of divine power in our lives. Each apparition has its own call to Christian holiness since Mary always points away from herself to her Son. Lourdes with its connection to the Immaculate Conception, reminds us that, like Mary, we are all caught up in God's grace even from the beginning of our lives.

At *Fatima*, when Mary declared herself *Our Lady of the Rosary*, we sense a call to a deeper reflection on the mysteries of Christ's life as they are lived out in the liturgical year.

Guadelupe brings together two cultures; the indigenous people living in what is now called Mexico and the conquering Spaniards. Out of this meeting was born a new culture, what we know today as Mexican. There are those who claim that there would be no Mexico, if there were no Lady of Guadelupe. In appearing to Juan Diego she takes the side of the most despised, the downtrodden and the conquered. Probably in no other apparition of Mary is there such a strong emphasis on social justice. At Tepeyac she gives new meaning to

the words that she uttered in her visitation to Elizabeth: "He casts down the mighty from their thrones and lifts up the lowly."

The title of *Patroness of the Americas* has been given to Guadelupe. This title tells the world, especially those in North, Central and South America that Guadelupe does not belong to Mexico alone. Our Lady of Guadelupe cannot be marginalized as simply the object of Mexican piety. As for Juan Diego, he is much more than a poor Indian to whom Mary gave a gift of roses in wintertime. In him, she has a powerful companion for the evangelization of the Americas.

"Know for certain that I am the true and perpetual Virgin Mary, Mother of the one True God... Here I will show and offer all My love, my compassion, my Help and protection to the People. I am your merciful Mother, the Mother of all who love me, of those who cry to me, of those who have confidence in me. Here I will hear their weeping and their sorrows... their necessities and misfortunes... Listen and let it penetrate your heart...Do not be troubled or weighed down with grief. Do not fear any illness or vexation, anxiety or pain. Am I not here who am your Mother? Are you not under my shadow and protection? Am I not your fountain of life? Are you not in the folds of my mantle?"

Words of the Blessed Virgin spoken to Juan Diego on 9th and 12th Dec. 1531 at Guadalupe, Mexico.

Pope John XXIII proclaimed a **Marian Year** of Our Lady of Guadelupe from
12 December 1960 to 12 December
1961 and extolled her as "**the Mother** *of the Americas.*" The moving
prayer he composed exemplified his
filial devotion and homage to her:
"*Hail Mother of the Americas*,

Heavenly Missionary of the New World! From the sanctuary of Tepeyac, for more than four centuries you have been the Mother and the teacher of the Faith to the peoples of the Americas. Be also our protection and save us, O Immaculate Mary. Aid our rulers; stir up a new zeal in our prelates; increase

the virtues of our clergy and preserve forever our Faith. In every home may the holiness of the family flourish, and in the shelter of the home may Catholic education, favored by your own benign glance, achieve a wholesome growth."

To be Forever Remembered in the Life of this Holy Apostolate, this 'House of Pilgrimage'


SHRINE TREE \$800
