

The Basilica is undergoing some structural preparation to receive the magnificent new pipe organ that you were promised.

I'm delighted to share with you that the preparatory work has begun. And, the building of the organ itself is in its final stages at the Schoenstein & Co. facility, in San Francisco.

The preparation and installation will take more than a few months. We will be busy throughout the Summer and into the Fall and there will be an exciting reveal, please God, in November.

WHY A PIPE ORGAN?

e sometimes get asked, "Why a pipe organ for Mary's Shrine?"

Great question!

The reality is the pipe organ has been the traditional musical instrument of the Church for centuries. Although the first pipe organs were built in Greece around 200 BC, it wasn't until around the year 900 AD that the pipe organ began being used in European churches. The Benedictines were the most enthusiastic to develop pipe organs and polyphonic music as part of their church services.

The pipe organ became uniquely suitable for church singing as the tones were firm and sustained, much like a brass instrument. By the 19th century, pipe organs were "standard equipment" in most churches; cathedrals and major shrines had large and elaborate organs built in their choir lofts.

There is something special about the sound of a pipe organ in a large church. The thousands of pipes working together not only create beautiful sound, but also serve as a reflection of the greatness of God and church community itself.

Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI wisely said, "The (pipe) organ has always been considered, and rightly so, the king of musical instruments, because it takes up all the sounds of creation ... and gives resonance to the fullness of human sentiments, from joy to sadness, from praise to lamentation. By transcending the merely human sphere, as all

music of quality does, it evokes the divine. The organ's great range of timbre, from piano through to a thundering fortissimo, makes it an instrument superior to all others. It is capable of echoing and expressing all the experiences of human life. The manifold possibilities of the organ in some way remind us of the immensity and the magnificence of God."

The Holy Father went on by saying, "In an organ, the many pipes and voices must form a unity. If here or there something becomes blocked, if one pipe is out of tune, this may at first be perceptible only to a trained ear. But if more pipes are out of tune, dissonance ensues, and the result is unbearable."

Now, this is an image of our community in the Church. Just as an organ in an expert hand must constantly bring disharmony back to consonance, so we in the Church, in the variety of our gifts and charisms, always need to find a new, through our communion in faith, harmony in the praise of God and in fraternal love."

The pipe organ is truly a sacred instrument and will always be associated with the Church. The American Guild of Organists even recognizes this and has chosen as its motto "Soli Dei Gloria" "To the Glory of God Alone."

May we rejoice in the wisdom of Monsignor Joseph Harte who envisioned this majestic instrument for Mary's Shrine as well as our present rector, Fr. Paul Henry who is bringing this dream to reality!




